Having just come back from a trip to Maui, I realized I have said Aloha and Mahola a lot during the 10 days we were there. So, what do they really mean?

Aloha in Hawaiian means hello and goodbye. Using Hawaiian language's grammatical rules, the word translates literally as "The joyful sharing of life energy in the present" or simply "joy fully sharing life." We've seen that Aloha is indeed a way of life, an attitude, and it even contains guidelines to help us in our lives. It is most definitely a "word to the wise." Mahalo is used as a 'thank you.' Thank you for wearing your mask. Mahalo for following the rules.

On a spiritual level, "aloha" is an invocation of the Divine and "mahalo" is a Divine blessing. Both are acknowledgments of the Divinity that dwells within and without.

Aloha [Alo = presence, front, face] + [hâ = breath]
"The presence of (Divine) Breath."

Mahalo [Ma = In] + [hâ = breath] + [alo = presence, front, face]
"(May you be) in (Divine) Breath."

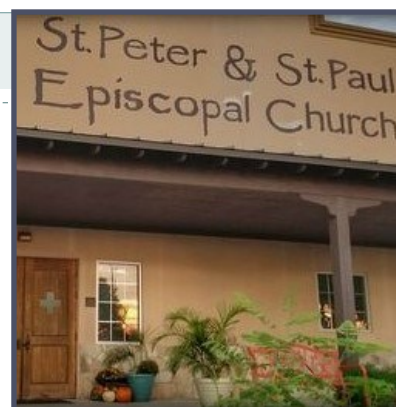
Think of them as single-word blessings or prayers. And, isn't that what we sometimes need? A single moment to be in the presence of the Almighty. A single moment to breathe in His breath.

BURIAL AT SEA ... HAWAIIAN STYLE



We were privileged to witness a 'sea burial' from our lanai. Here's how it works. After everyone has spoken, the older members of the family gather by an outrigger canoe pulled up on the shore. The canoe is the vehicle of honor for the ritual. The canoe carries the ashes of the deceased, as well as the surviving matriarch or patriarch. Anyone who is infirm or too young to paddle out alone may also ride in the canoe. Family members and friends bring lei and gently place them in the vessel. When all is ready, several men launch the canoe. Men riding **at** both ends of the canoe paddle it. When the group attains a few hundred feet from shore,

LAND SALE FINALIZED

As you all have seen, the property to the north of us (next to canal) has a lot of dirt work going on. The church/diocese has sold that property to the City of Mission. They are building a “detention pond” which will allow flood water a place to accumulate and eventually drain into the canal. We have received the funds from the sale of that property. Following are the details:

Sale Price of 5 acre lot	\$725,000.00	
Less Closing Costs & Legal Fees	6,281.00	
Less Outstanding Loan to Diocese	<u>150,000.00</u>	(Diocese forgave \$150,000 of this loan.)
Net to St Peter & St Paul	\$568,719.00	

Your Bishop’s Committee has placed \$500,000 of those funds into the Church Foundation Investment Fund. \$68,719.00 was left in the operating account. Last month (September) we spent \$48,078 to have our parking lot re-surfaced, re-striped and speed bumps installed.

So, what’s next? We will use those funds to repair the roof to get rid of leaks, re-plumb the kitchen sink, put new flooring, toilets and paint in both restrooms, trim the trees, remove the dead palms, update the landscaping, and purchase a digital sign. Also, we want to build a “sound booth” at the back of the sanctuary to house the video and audio equipment.

Now ... does this mean we’re “set for life?” Absolutely not!! Our church will still need your financial gifts. It’s how we operate day-to-day. Our size has dwindled because of the pandemic and other factors. We need to rebuild our church if we want to see it survive. We are currently \$20,000 short of being even. We cannot continue like this; however, we have to repair the building to help attract people here.

AND, you NEED to give. That’s how you are blessed. Your generosity is a conduit for God in your life. In addition to giving, your task in all this is to (1) pray daily for the mission of St Peter & St Paul, (2) pay your pledge for this year and prepare your pledge for next year, (3) invite friends and neighbors to church with you. Jesus is here in our small gatherings. But, wouldn’t it be fun if there were lots more of us??

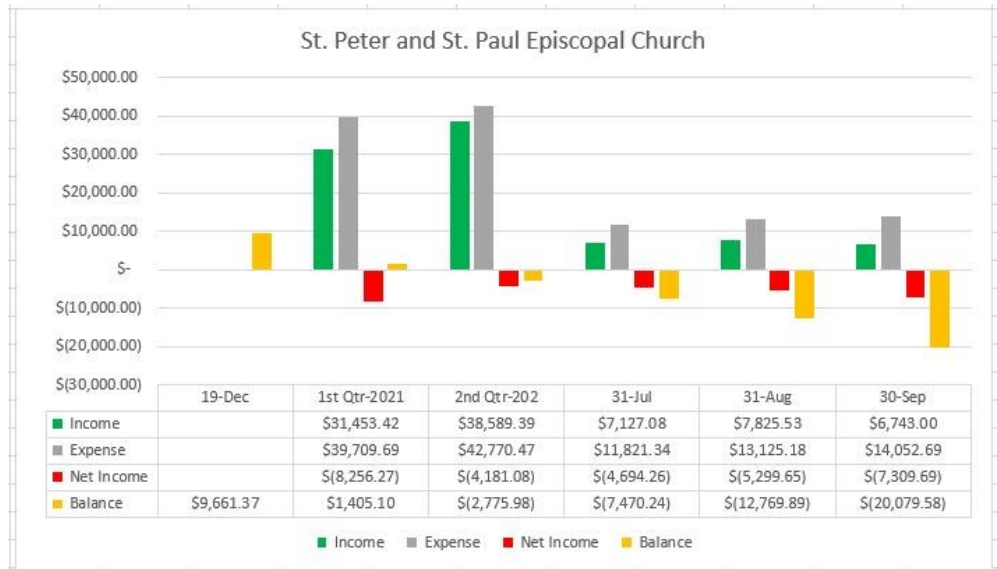

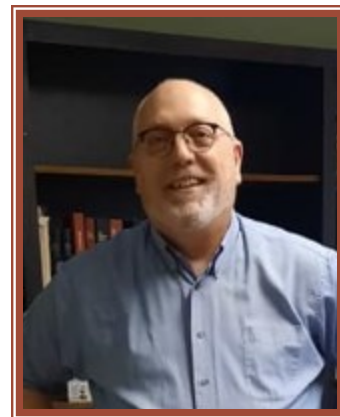
FATHER MIKE'S MUSINGS

It's a Spiritual Issue

In stewardship campaigns, it can be tempting to approach the financial needs of the church as if we were simply funding the budget. When taking the next step, we acknowledge that living generously is an inseparable part of following Christ. God does not need our money; rather, we need to give it as an act of gratitude and trust.

It's About Trust

As we learn to trust God more and follow Christ's teaching more faithfully, we learn to depend less on ourselves and more on God, relinquishing attitudes and habits that impede our relationship with God.



During this time of celebration, we encourage you to:

- ♦ Deepen your sense of generosity and gratitude.
- ♦ Discover the joy of giving.
- ♦ Give a percentage of your income systematically.
